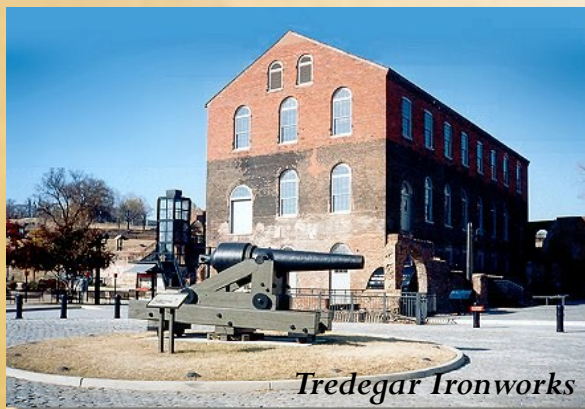

In the early 1830s, the city of Richmond, Virginia had many small foundries which were constantly merging to form new companies. The city's dependence on these copious industries made it unique from the rest of the south. Also, it was unlike the north in that these industries made use of slave labour. By the middle of the century the city was to walk a fine line between these two worlds. Today, it is Richmond's Visitor's Center.

Richmond's story includes a naval battle, a key industrial complex, the Confederacy's largest hospital, dozens of miles of elaborate original fortifications, and the evocative spots where determined soldiers stood paces apart and fought with rifles, reaping a staggering human cost. Richmond National Battlefield Park is located in central Virginia approximately 10 miles south of Washington, D.C. The park encompasses a large area with battlefield sites and visitor centers located in the City of Richmond, and Henrico, Hanover and Chesterfield counties.

Fredericksburg Battlefield

Tour Colonial home sites and battlefields to discover the over-all presence of the participants' beliefs as the stories of history unfold in the Fredericksburg-Spotsylvania-Stafford area. Walk where these early leaders walked and, if you care to, pray where they prayed.

Harper's Ferry is the site of the famous John Brown's Raid in 1859. John Brown believed he was called by God to free the slaves. He attempted to accomplish this by leading a revolt that failed. Was he truly called and did he truly fail? The historian will pay particular attention to this subject. Decide yourself if he was a saint or sinner.

When Lee was preparing to take the war to the north, he sent Stonewall Jackson to capture Harper's Ferry in September of 1862. Learning that

his incursion into Maryland, Lee decided to surround the force and capture it. On September 15, 1862, the Union commander surrendered the garrison. Jackson took possession of Harper's Ferry, then led most of his soldiers to join with Lee at Sharpsburg.



Antietam Battlefield

1:00 p.m. - Depart for Antietam Battlefield, 15-mile drive.

23,000 soldiers were killed, wounded or missing after 12 hours of savage combat on September 17, 1862. The Battle of Antietam ended the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia's first Invasion into the North and led to Abraham Lincoln's issuance of the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation. The battlefield still looks much like it did in September of 1862.

The Battle of Gettysburg, fought in July of 1863, was one of the most critical battles of the Civil War. Often referred to as the "High Water Mark of the Confederacy," it was the culmination of the second most ambitious invasion of the North by Lee and his army. The northerners fought at Gettysburg with the

desperation born of defending their home territory. The union victory resulted in Lee's retreat to Virginia and signaled the end to the hopes of the Confederacy for independence.
